Welcome everyone!

This Fall there will only be one service at 10:30 am each Sunday. Please register with Karen Haslam (519-273-5398) for every Sunday service. There will be no 8:30 am Sunday services planned at this time. One reason for this is the need to sanitize the church after each service

During the service, please note:

- 1. <u>Masks will be required</u> in the building as required by government regulations. People are asked to bring their own. However, there will be masks available for those who do not have them.
- 2. People attending will be required to sign in. This is necessary for contact tracing required by both the government and diocese.
- 3. Orders of service will be <u>in the pew</u> where you sit. We are asked to take these home after the service. There are no books in the pews.
- 4. <u>Hand sanitizers</u> will be available at check in and throughout the church.
- 5. Washroom facilities will be limited to one washroom in the upper hall and one accessible washroom next to the office. The washrooms under the narthex are closed.
- 6. After checking in, ushers will point you to your seats. Social distancing of 6 feet has been considered both in access to and in the seating pattern.

 To maximize the number allowed in the church you will be shown to a

- seat and the church filled in order. This means that you will likely not be able to sit at your normal location.

 Once seated, we ask that you do not move around the nave. Physical greetings cannot be allowed.

 There will be no social greeting or gathering afterwards.
- 7. During the service, movement around the nave will be very limited. There will be a <u>simple procession and no</u> recession.
- 8. There will be <u>no choir or</u> <u>congregational singing</u>. Music will be limited to instrumental; organ, piano and instrumental soloists. Singing will be limited to a soloist at the high altar.
- 9. After the service, the congregation will remain at their seats until ushered out of the church. The intent is that people will leave via the narthex door closest to end of their aisle.
- 10. We are asked <u>not to congest</u> doorways or areas directly outside so social distancing can be observed.

There are a lot of rules and changes. However, those planning the return to worship in the church are making every effort to make it meaningful and safe. If you have any concerns before, during or after a service please contact the wardens or our back to church coordinator, Rick Falshaw.

In Flanders Fields



by John McCrae, May 1915

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

Inspiration for the poem — In Flanders Fields

During the Second Battle of Ypres, a Canadian artillery officer, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer, was killed on 2 May, 1915 by an exploding shell. He was a friend of the Canadian military doctor **Major John McCrae**.

John was asked to conduct the burial service owing to the chaplain being called away on duty elsewhere. It is believed that later that evening John began the draft for his famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.
